The core poets I analyze, Juan Gelman, Paco Urondo, Adrienne Rich, and Anne Sexton, strove against silence and ignorance by representing in poetry the difficult truths they each experienced and shared with their fellow citizens. I argue that this confessional poetry was necessarily angled for access and change; and that its poets advocated for solidarity, for audience awareness, and for poetry's political capacity in their language use and poetic praxes, including especially the autobiographical "I," a proximal voice, and other techniques ranging from urgent to indirect.
